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Business Meeting Minutes - August 21, 2013

The meeting was started promptly at 7:30pm by Faithful Navigator Steve Dodaro.

Roll call of officers was taken and the only one missing to this Scribe's knowledge was the Scribe. PFN George Schneider happily agreed to take notes and here is my best effort at deciphering.

No communications were mentioned.

The minutes were corrected to list the District Meeting in September rather than June. They were then motioned to be approved as corrected, voted upon and approved.

Our Faithful Friar (now Spiritual Advisor) then spoke on how we should guide others as evangelists of our faith. He mentioned Father Backes and how we should share our faith by our acts in public. We should strive to be like Mary and be the light of Christ.

Our Faithful Comptroller read a list of bills, covering dinner expenses and the purchase of our storage cabinet. These were then motioned to be sent to the Trustees for payment, voted on and passed. He also noted that we are now 102 members strong.

Our Faithful Captain reported thirty eight people were in attendance for the dinner tonight. \$99 was collected with expenses of \$37.23. Our Faithful Purser spoke on our funds and revenue and we are in fine financial straits.

Respect Life: Right to Life News

Respect Life: An Amazing Woman

In August an amazing young woman from Seton Parish won the Catholic Woman of the Year award. Liz Christy is the wife of Aaron and daughter of Chuck and Pat Gray, also from Seton. Because she is so involved with Respect Life, I thought you should know about this remarkable young woman.

Elizabeth Ann Christy is a wife, a mother of two, and an active member at Seton Parish in Pickerington. She was named after St. Elizabeth Ann Seton who was canonized a few months before her birth. She is a certified nurse midwife who has delivered over 1,200 babies. If you are one of these families, you will undoubtedly always remember Liz. She brings a calmness and compassion to every delivery, but more importantly she brings her faith. She prays the Chaplet of Divine Mercy as she drives in for the delivery. She secretly crosses the head of every baby that emerges. If the family asks, she will pray in the delivery room with them. She wants them to ask.

But with the joy of bringing life comes the enormity of handling decisions against life: pregnant mothers asking about abortion options, desperate women asking for fertility treatments, and of course the looming need for birth control. These are not infrequent conversations. These are every patient, everyday. This is part of the societal expectation for having an appointment with an OB-GYN practice.

When Liz was a student midwife, she felt her faith would fit perfectly in line with her profession. What could possibly be more pro-life than delivering babies? But very gradually, small decisions began to sneak in. Just learn how to write this prescription. Just help with these fertility treatments. She thought she always had the power to eventually opt out of these choices, but things snowballed. She soon found herself with a job that was severely disjointed with her faith.

Liz desperately struggled with this conflict between the Catholic teaching and the expectations of her job. She felt that the positive difference she was making was being undone by the obligation she felt in prescribing birth control. Spiritually, she felt in constant turmoil. She became busy with her job and stopped singing in the choir - something she had always loved to do. She had a well paying job, a house, a strong marriage, and two beautiful children. She had everything society said should make her happy, but inside she was a mess. She looked around and saw a world that simply did not lean toward the Catholic view on procreation and she had no idea how to emerge from underneath the enormous weight of her decisions.

One day in a grocery parking lot, she heard a Catholic radio program on contraception and the effects on society. Liz hit bottom and broke down. She started saying out loud, "I know what I am doing is wrong, but this is too hard. I don't know what to do. Just show me and I'll do it." God did not wait long. The next day, a friend casually mentioned in general conversation that her OB-GYN provider did not prescribe birth control at all. Every light bulb turned on. This changed everything. Liz immediately began researching, planning, and preparing how she could implement the same thing within her own work.

After many weeks of careful preparation, she stepped into the office of the physician who owned the practice and stated that she could no longer in good conscience provide birth control or fertility treatments for patients. She knew that she might be fired from a job she loved, but she could not let her work obligations tear her away from her faith. She had to begin living her faith in all aspects of her life. Work could not be an exception.

She carefully laid out an alternate strategy where she could attend to pregnant patients and those that did not need birth control. She explained how the office could adapt to her needs and still be just as productive. He was confused and didn't understand. He tried to debate her and convince her that the decision was misguided. "Can't I have a chance to talk you out of it?" he asked. Liz said, "This is being directed by someone bigger than me and I have to go along with it. I need to know if we can make this work. Can I stay here or do you need me to leave?" He said, "Let's not get crazy here. Let me have time to process and think. I have questions to ask, but we can work this out." He finally agreed, but left it up to Liz to explain her decision to others and ensure the implementation.

When you take such a public risk to realign your life to Christ, you become a witness. People notice. Staff, patients, nurses, other physicians, and even friends begin asking questions. Difficult questions. However, like in most things, Liz not only prays, she prepares.

Why does she follow this antiquated, burdensome Church teaching on birth control? Liz explains the Church teaching on not the simple "rule", but the Catholic reasoning that supports it. In doing so, she shines light on an alternate path that is not predicated on inclusion of birth control. Why would the Church be so callous to deny an infertile couple the right to have a baby? Liz discreetly teaches Pope Paul VI's Humanae Vitae using her own life and previous patients as reference. Patients ask about whether they should test for genetic defects. Liz bluntly explains that there are two kinds of people: those who want to know this answer to terminate their baby's life and those that believe the knowledge can help them prepare. Mothers stop, take a step back, and are forced to examine their conscience. Seeing these kinds of actions and hearing an educated explanation demands a response.

Patients ordinarily ignored and disregarded in everyday society are treated with such kindness and respect that after several visits with Liz, one recent patient named her newborn daughter "Elizabeth Christy". Fellow midwifes ask questions Catholic devotion to Mary. Liz introduces them to Mary, and the next day buys them rosaries and an instructional booklet so that they can begin their own journey. One of these recipients has since decided to become Catholic and baptize her children. People find a high level of comfort with Liz and begin publicly opening up about their faith -- asking questions, looking for guidance. One Baptist physician asked Liz to sing at her mother's Catholic funeral. Whether they are aware or not, Liz is slowly beginning to pull them towards the Church. When a physician told Liz that he needed some kind of sign before going back to Church, Liz smiled, calmly looked up at him and said, "Why do you think I am here?"

These are not ordinary reactions. T hese are not people deciding what flavor of coffee to buy. These are people making drastic changes to their lives through explicit examples of love and conviction. Catholics, prior Catholics, people with no religious affiliation, friends, family, patients -- all of them see something

amazing in Liz. Someone courageous. Someone no longer willing to compromise her faith. A woman whose actions toward veryone she meets is clearly being led by someone else. And when you see someone like this, you can't help but want it for yourself. You begin to see yourself in her actions.

Making a significant life change has no choice but to bleed into your spiritual life and participation within your parish. Liz continues to be an active member of the Music Ministry and a routine cantor at Sunday mass, weddings, and funerals. The Lord has blessed her with a beautiful singing voice that always comes across with feeling, meaning, and a wondrous calm. At a pro-life prayer rally that was held inside the Ohio State House, Liz showed up and as they were ready to begin reciting the Chaplet of Divine Mercy, she asked if they would like someone to sing it instead. Hearing her voice echoing off the cold walls of the statehouse was an extremely moving and prayerful experience.

At this year's vacation bible school, Liz led the music program, encouraging 130 young children to sing and follow hand motions for songs describing God's love in their lives. The children could not help responding to her gentle, loving, and spirit-filled presence on the stage. She also works through the parish Respect Life committee where she shares her story as a witness and delivers meals to the Bethesda Healing Ministry.

Her efforts have served as a springboard to help the Pregnancy Decision Health Center where she volunteers in their offices. In addition she has served as the coordinator for the Seton "Baby Bottle" fund raising campaign and voiced the radio promotion for their Pickerington location fund raiser on AM 820. During Respect Life Month, she assembled a program on pro-life issues and presented it to the religious education program at Seton. She is involved with all pro-life activities in the parish and includes her husband and two children whenever the activity allows it.

It becomes clear that at some point, your Catholic faith is going to directly collide with some competing aspect of your personal life. It may be your work, your friends, or even your spouse making it seem that the societal choice is the only one to be made. Liz has shown that you always have another option. She demonstrates through her actions that it is possible to find the courage to realign yourself with Christ and in doing so, touch countless lives by your example. With God's grace, you can become a witness and a teacher. Without question, Liz Christy is both.



This Month's Manual of the Month is the Fourth Degree Program Manual. To quote directly from the forward
